

<u>Firearms Safety:</u> While Virginia Beach remains among the safest cities of its size in America, we're not immune to violent crime. Regrettably, most of the homicides of the past two months involve teenagers with firearms (as both shooters and victims). Dead are a 14-year-old, a 15-year-old, and a 16-year-old. Other youngsters have crippling injuries. Each and every weapon recovered from these incidents was illegally possessed (many stolen from vehicles) or improperly secured. I think that many teens fail to comprehend the permanent consequences of discharging a firearm. Perhaps they're mind-numbed by violent shoot-'em-up video games, but there is no reset switch on life. Once they pull the trigger; that's it. Game over!

Responsibility is an essential element of the right to keep and bear arms. <u>Please keep your weapons</u> <u>secure and do not leave them in vehicles</u>. If you have children, it might be worth allowing them to witness (say, at the range) just how powerful these items are and to instill in them the knowledge that firearms are not toys. Teach them the fundamentals:

- 1. Treat every firearm as loaded until proven otherwise
- 2. Never point a firearm at anything you do not intend to shoot (i.e., kill)
- 3. If you find an unsecured weapon, call an adult or 9-1-1 and do not touch it.

<u>Hurricane Season</u>: Once again, meteorologists are calling for an above-average number of named hurricanes this season (June 1 – November 30). Last year we witnessed storms grow from Category 1 to Category 5 virtually overnight, as a result of warmer mid-ocean waters. 

P<u>rotect the Dunes</u>: Our sand dunes are the last line of defense from rampaging wind and wave. Help protect them by (a) **not disturbing any vegetation** growing upon them (yes, it is unlawful to do so) and (b)

installing sand fencing in accordance with the guidelines found elsewhere in this Newsletter. Many sand fences are improperly installed.

<u>Rip Current Escape Notes</u>: We don't need a hurricane for Virginia Beach to be subjected to rip currents that can pull swimmers out to sea. Storms hundreds of miles away can create these potentially deadly phenomena. Swimmers can escape rip currents if they keep calm and follow the graphic below – landlords – <u>please post in every rental unit</u>:

If red warning flags are flying, **do not** get into the ocean beyond your knees. Parents – accompany and watch your small children. If a child is knocked down by a wave, they'll be underwater in seconds. You cannot save them if you're twenty feet away or on a phone.



<u>Scams and Frauds</u>: Within the past week, social media has been active with reports of the following scams being perpetrated in our area: the Sheriff Imposter Scam, the Romantic Meet-up Scam, and the Cell Phone Instant Loan Scam. Please read my March Newsletter notes (available at https://croatanbeach.org) for more info on these scams. Stay aware of your surroundings (think: "keep your head out of your apps") and don't become a victim.

<u>Five Minutes to Protect Wildlife</u>: My wife and I always carry extra bags to the beach because we often spend more time picking up detritus than we do focusing on our dog (although we do keep her close and clean up her "gifts"). Bottle caps, plastic cigar tips, small baggies, straws, discarded fishing tackle, merchandise labels, and food wrappers of every description easily fill one or two extra bags per visit. Alice suggested placing a note in the CCL Newsletter asking beachfront owners if they would be willing to devote <u>five minutes per day</u> to keep the beach to the east of their property clear of trash. All of this flotsam finds its way into the water and into the stomachs of marine and avian fauna. Believe me, we do not want the stench of a dead porpoise or whale washing up on our doorstep.

<u>Take Care of your Pets</u>: Summer Seasonal Dog Regulations are now in place through Labor Day. Dogs are not allowed on Croatan Beach between the hours of 10:00 AM and 6:00 PM daily. They **are** allowed to run, unleashed, at other times but must be under handler's verbal command. Handlers must clean up after their dogs. Bags and trash cans are available at each beach entrance.

Try to <u>refrain from walking animals during the height of the day</u>. Pavement retains the sun's heat and can scorch paw pads. Also, please clean up any neighbor's lawn they might soil. Golden rule, folks.

<u>Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC)</u>: Meets every second Wednesday at 7:00 PM in the conference room of Virginia Beach Volunteer Rescue Squad #14, 740 VB Blvd (17th Street). CAC meetings are open to all.

The Second Precinct CAC serves as a tax-exempt conduit for sending money and in-kind donations to the Virginia Beach Animal Care and Adoption Center, 341 S. Birdneck Road. The Care Center is always seeking volunteers.

The CAC is seeking volunteers to spend 2 – 4 hours setting-up, serving, and cleaning-up the Independence Day <u>Adopt-a-Muster</u> event to feed the expected 150+ police officers and sheriff deputies who will be working the Oceanfront on that day. The food is arranged, but we need warm bodies to assist. This will be held on Thursday, July 4 from 2:30 – 6:00 PM at the Precinct Headquarters (820 VB Blvd (17th Street) –

enter from the 18th Street side. Please let Connie Agresti or Jenny Perry (757-724-2232) know if you can help out.

Public Beach Sand Fence Installation Guidelines

When properly installed, sand fences can help build dunes by trapping wind-blown sand. But if which properly and not maintained they can pose a risk to public safety, impede public access and use of the recreational beach, hinder emergency vehicle and beach maintenance access at times of high tide. Improperly installed sand fences can also trap or endanger sea turtles, their nests or hatchlings.

It is the policy of the City of Virginia Beach to allow installation of sand fencing in areas where dune formation is feasible and in areas where existing dunes have been damaged. Sand fencing may be installed in accordance with the following guidelines without the need for a separate permit. The City reserves the right to remove any sand fencing that is deemed to be contrary to the public interest or hazardous.

Installation of sand fencing must comply with the following:

- Sand fencing must be placed as far landward as possible to avoid interference with sea turtle nesting, public access and use of the beach.
 Landward end of sand fencing must tie into an existing bulkhead, property line,

- Landward end of sand rending must be into an existing bulknead, properly line, easement line, or established dunes. Sand fencing must be installed at a 45-degree or greater angle to the shoreline. Each section of fence must not be longer than 10 feet, and sections must be spaced at least 7 feet apart. (Once 50% of the fence height and length has been covered by sand an additional row of fencing can be installed offset 5 feet within the existing row of fencing.)
- an additional row or terricing centure instance.

 fencing.)

 5. Sand fencing shall only be allowed within 20 horizontal feet of the property or easement line. No sand fencing shall be allowed outside this 20 foot zone.

 6. A minimum horizontal distance of 100 feet shall be maintained between the seaward limit of the sand fencing and mean high water (MHW).

 7. The fencing must be no taller than 5 feet and built from evenly spaced thin wooden vertical slats connected with twisted wire.
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 8. Sand fences must not be installed within 20 feet of a public beach access.

 9. Sand fences must be installed without the use of mechanical equipment.

 11. No grading or pushing up of sand is allowed.

 12. If sand fencing it is to full stand line accordance with these guidelines it must be removed.

- and/or re-installed in full compliance.
- If sand fence becomes loose, broken or deemed to be hazardous it must be removed or repaired.

 If sand fence becomes exposed by high tides or erosion it must be removed.

- Existing sand fence that extends more than 20 feet into the public beach shall be removed back to within 20 feet.
 Should shoreline erosion cause the horizontal distance between sand fencing and MHW decrease to less than 100 feet, sand fencing shall be removed to the extent necessary to maintain the 100 foot minimum distance.
