Ladies and Gentlemen,

Happy (slightly belated) New Year to all.

The Board of Directors met on Monday, January 6th at Mike Fantozzi's home.

The treasurer's report showed 416 member names, an increase from 391 in the previous year, with about sixty new members added in the last three months.

The focus of effort was to discuss the 2025 budget and event schedule. Our costs continue to go up and we are taking a close look at ways to offset these rising costs. At the end of the year, the combined money for security and the general fund totaled approximately \$34,600 (\$5,000 and \$29,000, respectively.) A few members have said that we have too much in our account. It's not. Our 2025 budget forecasts expenses at \$35,850. The board voted to leave member dues the same - \$80 per couple and \$45 for singles. We expect revenue to be about \$32,700 through dues and Spring Fling tickets and raffle. This will result in a planned shortfall of approximately \$3,150. This is in line with our 2023 decision to reduce the general account down to \$20,000. We think that is a comfortable reserve.

The security fund is kept separate from the general fund as it is a volunteer donation. Some people object to paying for additional security. Our surveys show that the majority of members want it to continue. The forecast budget for security is \$22,000. It is a lot of donations, and rates continue to rise.

We are going to try something different this year with quarterly town halls. Our first one will be in March. We will cover the neighborhood security program and provide an update on the beach sand and weir projects. We will also be asking for input on what you would like to discuss. Look for a specific announcement soon.

Don't forget about the Dominion Energy CVOW meeting on Thursday the 16th of January at the South Aquarium building. Start time is 5:30 PM.

The next Board of Director's meeting will be held on Monday, February 3, at 6:30 PM. The location is at my home, and I would appreciate RSVP's if you want to attend






VBCCO Meeting Wednesday December 18, 2024

GRANT AMOUNT & PROJECT TIMELINE

Safety/Security - January, 2025

Bottom Line Up Front:

<u>Security Survey Results</u>: I want to personally thank everyone who responded to the security survey. The data captured provide the CCL Board with insight into what our neighborhood desires in the way of security.

<u>Acid Test</u>: More than seventy percent of respondents agree that the costs and policies of VBPD's designated contractor (Off-Duty Management (ODM)) are problematic – i.e., cost-prohibitive for the level of services they desire. However, <u>more than seventy percent also feel that the police presence should continue</u>. A significant number of people suggested looking into private security companies or employing automated systems (discussed later).

<u>Presence vs. Patrol</u>: Survey respondents were equally split between their desire to see a police presence along Croatan Road or having police patrol the neighborhood. We have asked our officers to split their time by doing both. We have also asked our officers to focus on crime deterrence versus speeding (which is not to say that the latter will be abandoned) by increasing their patrols during "high-crime vulnerability hours" (i.e., wee hours of the morning). Please do not complain that you do not see them if they're out after midnight and you're not. I will also be keeping the pressure on Second Precinct to send periodic patrols through Croatan as their operations in higher crime areas permit.

<u>Private Security Firms</u>: The CCL investigated private security firms as an alternative. While offering a lower hourly rate, the well-respected firms with whom we spoke expressed the desire for us to employ their services full-time. Despite a lower hourly rate, employing a full-time equivalent (FTE) (i.e., 2,000+hours) would triple the annual cost requirement to approximately \$60,000. The CCL Board of Directors has discussed this and agrees that we simply cannot afford an FTE-level of services.

Other factors weigh in against pursuing private security guards. These include (1) guards are not empowered to cite, ticket, detain, or arrest suspects; (2) we cannot guarantee that guards possess the level of training needed to de-escalate situations; (3) the fallback action for guards confronted with a difficult situation, is the same as any citizen – call 9-1-1; (4) the potential liability to CCL by employing private security is immeasurable.

A hybrid alternative that may be available is to contract with a private security firm to park a marked (unmanned) car in a visible location (e.g., Croatan Road). Some have suggested that this presence is sufficient deterrence, but we have not seen data to support that assertion, nor does CCL Board think that this would be effective in the long run as a vehicle's stationary, unmanned presence would soon become evident. Still, it is a consideration.

<u>Automated Security Systems</u>: Some respondents suggested that CCL obtain and position automated monitoring systems within the neighborhood. The logical location for these would be Croatan Road – our neighborhood's single route of ingress/egress. If the systems are to be solar powered (versus siphoning off someone's electricity), the best location would be east of Christine Drive/Kerry Lane, as any

closer to the esses at our entrance is shaded. Additionally, we'd have to piggyback off of a nearby resident's Wi-Fi signal. That's a big "ask." Regardless, such systems are reactive only in that they record suspected misdeeds or arriving/departing vehicles. Their ability to proactively deter crime can't really be measured because you cannot measure intent or something that does not occur

Alternatively, many residents already have home security systems, whether smart-doorbells or more sophisticated camera/alarm systems. While CCL can encourage their purchase and use, it remains an individual decision whether to employ such systems. These systems represent "defense in depth" and residents are asked to share any video they capture of nefarious activity with police. (Croatan does have a sign near our entrance citing video surveillance use).

<u>Neighborhood Watch</u>: The VBPD does have a Neighborhood Watch Program (<u>Neighborhood Watch Program | City of Virginia Beach</u>) but it has suffered from dwindling participation in recent years; in part due to training and reporting requirements (e.g., neighborhoods should not exceed 250 households, 60% of households must participate in the program; each group of 20 homes must have a block captain), that seem (IMHO) overly burdensome. Since the program stipulates that participants are to "observe and report suspicious activity to VBPD" and "not physically intervene or attempt to detain suspects," I do not see that changing much from what we already have among our concerned neighbors.

Future of Security Fund: In response to the overwhelming desire (> 70%) of residents, CCL has little choice but to continue to employ (at least in the near-term) off-duty VBPD officers through the ODM contractor system. Doing so establishes a Security Fund "bogey" of approximately \$22,000 for 2025. If every CCL member (and even nonmember residents) contributed just \$100, we'll make that budget level handily and have the flexibility to expand services, if necessary. The Security Fund is a cooperative insurance policy for our neighborhood of high-6 and 7-figure homes — a "C-Note" apiece should not break anyone's piggy bank.

<u>Be Seen at Night</u>: I was startled the other evening as a black dog and owner (in dark clothing), both without reflectorized or lighted garments, appeared in my headlight beam, way too close for comfort to either of us. Although we are now getting longer hours of sunlight, it is still dark out there. Please ensure that you and your pup can be seen.

<u>Black Ice</u>: When the ambient temperature is at or below freezing (32° F), pavement dampened by dew, fog, or precipitation can acquire a glaze of ice that is not always visible. If the road looks wet, test for the presence of ice by braking while driving slowly in the neighborhood.

Be mindful that even on sunny days, elevated roadbeds, bridges, roadways in shadow, or the edges of curves may be slick even when the rest of the road seems clear. Drive cautiously and defensively. If you skid, ease off the throttle and steer into the skid – do <u>NOT</u> mash on the brakes, even if they are anti-lock. Final note: <u>Clear all windows before you drive</u> – you can't avoid what you can't see.

<u>Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC)</u>: The next CAC meeting will be held on January 8, 2025, at 7:00 PM in the conference room of Virginia Beach Volunteer Rescue Squad #14, 740 VB Blvd (17th Street). Please park on the east side of the building. CAC meetings are open to all.

<u>Personal Safety and Antiterrorism</u>: We were all shocked to hear of the mass-casualty event in New Orleans and sensationalized suicide in Las Vegas on New Year's Day. Although, current news reports suggest that the latter was an individual statement vice an attempt to inflict mass casualties, the former certainly was not. Couple this with the large cache of explosives recovered recently by FBI in nearby Isle of Wright County and the ongoing political discord in the country, the suggestion that home-grown and/or

radicalized extremists are out there is not untoward. Exercise increased caution around large venues and "soft targets" – like shopping malls, concerts, etc. <u>If you see something</u>, say something.
